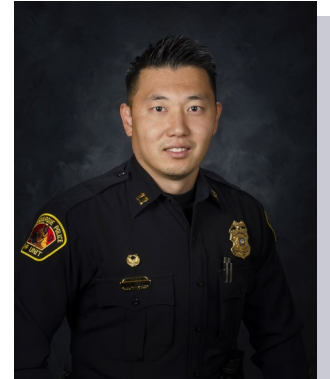

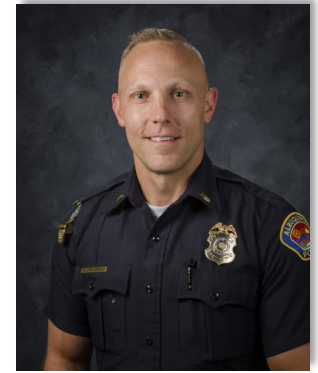

Message from Acting Deputy Commander

October was a busy month for the University Area Command. A highlight from the month came in the form of a carjacking at 2801 Lomas Ne. Andrew McCartney (pictured below) used a screw driver to Carjack a Tesla. Mr. McCartney stole the Tesla and began traveling east on I-40 while University Area Command Officer R. Goodall responded to the scene. Officer Goodall was able to utilize the victims iPhone application to track the vehicle as it traveled east on I-40. Officer Goodall could not remotely shut the vehicle down until Mr. McCarthy put the vehicle in park. Officer Goodall was able to utilize the Tesla application to open the trunk of the vehicle while it was driving, turn up the heater, and other ways to make Mr. McCarthy uncomfortable in the stolen vehicle. Albuquerque Police detectives were able to quickly locate the vehicle and took Mr. McCarthy into custody in Santa Rosa, New Mexico. Mr. McCarthy was subsequently charged with Armed Robbery, Unlawful Taking of a Motor Vehicle, and Larceny. Mr. McCarthy was captured due to the quick response and heads up thinking by Officer Goodall and APD detectives!

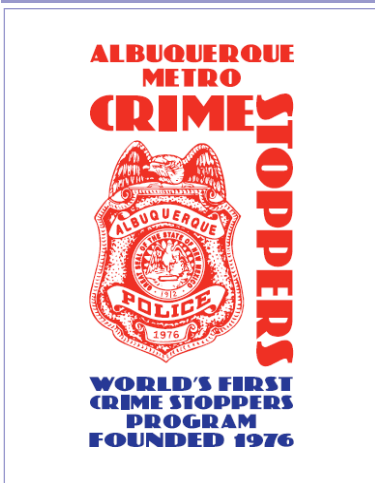

ABQ 311

Help me clean up graffiti in our community and download the "ABQ 311" App. It's easy, if you see graffiti in our community stop in a safe area and take a photo. Pin your location and give a brief description of what and where the graffiti is located so our city employees can easily respond for clean-up.

Albuquerque Metro Crime Stoppers is a community program that relies on anonymous tips to solve crimes and to locate fugitives from justice. Without anonymity of callers, the program cannot be effective.

Crime Stoppers pays rewards only for anonymous tips. Tipsters who identify themselves are not eligible for a reward.

Crime Stoppers has sole discretion to decide the amount of any reward to be paid, from zero to \$1,000.

Crime Stoppers will pay rewards only for tips given directly to it. Any tip given to another source, such as law enforcement, will not be eligible for a Crime Stoppers reward.

Crime Stoppers does not pay rewards to any person who has a legal duty to assist in the arrest of suspects and fugitives.

Felony Gun Crime + Arrest = Up to a \$1,000 CASH REWARD

Know someone who has used a gun to commit a crime, a felon in possession of a firearm or someone in possession of a stolen firearm?

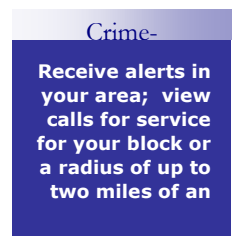

How to Recognize and Avoid a Scam

All scams have one thing in common. They attempt to get you to act from a place of emotion rather than one of intelligence. It is why the scammer uses familiar businesses, charities, government agencies or outright scare tactics to get our attention.

The top scams are imposter scams and romance scams. Imposter scams can be someone stating that they are from a well-known company and you have overpaid for a service or product and they need to complete a refund by remotely accessing your bank account; or someone telling you that your utility bill is overdue and your electricity will be turned off if you don't pay....by gift card. Or, perhaps someone pretending to be from law enforcement calling to say you have a warrant for not reporting to jury duty and if you don't pay will be arrested. The list spans only the imagination.

If you receive such a call, text, or email. STOP. Don't respond. Contact the company or entity directly to verify validity if you are at all in doubt. And, yes, you can check for warrants in Bernalillo County at https://bcapp.bernco.gov/BCSO_WarrantInterWITS/

Romance scams are the fastest growing type of scam affecting older adults. It is profitable for the scammer, sometimes netting them hundreds of thousands of dollars or more. Romance scammers will often groom their victims and invest time in making the relationship seem real. Some indicators of a romance scam:

- Can't meet you in person. If they do make plans, they will always fall through.
- Will ask you for money.
- Tell you how they want to receive payment, in a way hard for you to get back:
 - ◊Western Union or Money Gram
 - ◊Gift Cards + PIN Number
 - ◊Money Transfer App
 - ◊Cryptocurrency

Tactics to avoid romance scams:

- Avoid losing money to a scammer:
 - ◊Never send money to someone you haven't met in person (and some you have)
 - ◊Stop communicating immediately if something is not right.
 - ◊Talk to a friend or family member you trust
 - ◊Search online for the name plus the word scammer or position they say they hold plus the word scammer
 - ◊Reverse search profile images and/or images received from the person

A few simple steps to avoid a scam: block unwanted calls and text messages; don't provide personally identifying information to an unexpected request; resist the pressure; never pay someone who insists on payment by gift card, wire transfer service like Western Union or Money Gram or crypto currency; finally, STOP, talk to someone you trust.

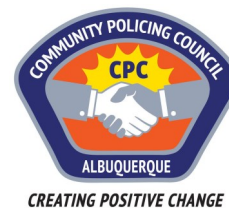
