

FOUR SPANISH TYPE HOUSES STARTED IN GRANADA HEIGHTS

The dream city on a hill, visioned by Mrs. Katherine Patterson and Mrs. Minnie Byrd, when they opened Granada Heights for building, is beginning to take tangible form. Several residences in Spanish and Indian architecture are being started in this exclusive residence district adjoining Nob Hill. These sisters, Mesdames Patterson and Byrd, experienced in developing city districts, having contracted with A. Rossiter to build on the corner of Carlisle and Lomalinde avenues an artistic six-room adobe dwelling to be plastered white like all the Spanish houses to be built on this hill. The Patterson-Byrd home will have sun rooms, heating plant, yet wholly Spanish. On the next corner facing the Sandias, Mr. and Mrs. John Strumquist will construct a six-room tile residence to be equipped with electric refrigeration machine and oil burner in the furnace basement. Coral tile hoods and black iron grillwork on three porches will offset the white walls of this house. Mr. and Mrs. R. F. Hulick are building also on Hermosa avenue, adjoining the Strumquist lots, a pretentious, picturesque Aztec Indian house, modeled after a historic Aztec mansion in Mexico City. Mr. Hulick, who has used advantageously the rose-tinted lava rock for building fireplaces, porch pillars and chimneys in other local houses, may

have another rose pink fireplace of lava rock.

Mrs. Gertrude Byrd is ready to begin construction of a six room adobe Spanish type home with wide porches, and modern equipment on Hermosa avenue adjoining the Hulick property. Three other homes not yet ready for contractors, are to begin construction after the holidays.

COLORADO COLLEGE BEATS MINERS, 20-16

Denver, Nov. 28 (AP)—A game rally in which the work of Carl Brown, stellar halfback, featured, was staged by Colorado College in the final period of their game against Colorado School of Mines here today, giving the Tigers a 20 to 16 victory. The game was the final contest of the season in the Rocky Mountain conference.

Both teams stood evenly at the end of the first half with a 7 to 7 score. Mines drew ahead in the third period with a placement field goal by Brummett. But Colorado College then scored, via the forward pass route, Brown to Jory, for 35 yards, a touchdown at the outset of the fourth period.

Another pass, Brown to Hall, for 20 yards, paved the way for another Tiger touchdown. Mines scored a touchdown in the final play of the game.
