HUT TRIP 2022!!!

HOW DOES MARGY'S SOUND ??? Guy Miller and Doug Erb will co-lead a 3-nighter to Margy's Hut, located near Aspen at an elevation of 11,300 feet. This hut, along with its twin, McNamara, was built in 1982 and is the oldest hut in the system. The solar system and wood burning stove have been improved/replaced since my first visit there in the mid-nineties.

We will leave Albuquerque on Monday, January 24, 2022 and ski in to the hut the following day. We'll leave the hut on Friday, January 28. Because it's a long ski out and a very long drive home, we'll plan on completing the journey back home on Saturday, January 29.

Margy's is a small hut with room for 16, but we'll be limiting participation to 12 skiers. Cost is \$245. Proof of Covid vaccination and booster, if applicable, will be required. Avalanche gear is required.

Telemark skiing is available on a south facing slope directly below the hut, as well as on nearby Mt Yeckel. Touring options can be had on roads and meadows in the area.



Sandia Nordic Trails Improvement Project (SNTIP)

For those of you who are also members of the Sandia Nordic Ski Club, you are probably already aware of the exciting news regarding the long-awaited permission to conduct trail improvement and modifications on the groomed sections of the nordic trails. Since the beginning of the club's existence, club volunteers have worked tirelessly to

shovel heavy snow to even out the camber of the course in areas that prove to be dangerous for skiers. As of May 2021, the final paperwork has been cleared and now that it is August, they have already had several field crew days to get the trails in-shape for the upcoming and future seasons!

Dear Members and Friends of Sandia Nordic,



I am extremely excited to announce that the Sandia Nordic Trails

Improvement Project (SNTIP) has received final sign-off from USFS allowing us to begin implementation of modifications to our trail system. Sections selected for reroutes had been previously identified over the course of several years and are based upon input from discussions with numerous trail users, the Sandia Nordic board, and on-site evaluations with Kerry Wood, Trails and Wilderness Manager for the Cibola National Forest and National Grasslands. Issues related to these modifications fell into several categories, including concern for skier safety, line of sight issues, difficulty for beginner and intermediate skiers, difficulty in grooming and erosion control.

As we move forward, Jeff Huser, in close consultation with Steve Roholt, will be heading up the implementation of the SNTIP. Much of the work will be done by our own Club members, as well as members of FOSM. Please keep your eye out for communications from Jeff announcing calls for volunteers to help on planned trail work dates.

This is a very exciting time for Sandia Nordic, and I cannot express enough gratitude to all those who have provided input to the Club regarding the planned modifications. Special thanks as well to Sam Beard and all of the members of FOSM, to the members of Sandia Nordic's board, to our Sandia District Ranger Crystal Powell, to Kerry Wood, and to all of the other members of USFS who helped usher this approval through the administrative process.
