The Postwar Transformation of Albuquerque, NM, 1945-1972

From the end of World War II to the closing months of 1972, as related in The Postwar Transformation of Albuquerque, New Mexico, 1945-1972 by author Robert Wood. The city underwent as dramatic a transformation as any American city ever has in such a short time.



Its population exploded from about 50,000 to more than five times that number, and the median income of its citizens adjusted for inflation doubled. Fundamental changes took place, as rugged individualism gave way to more cooperative behavior, and authority relaxed. Such broad social changes could also be seen in the country at large, but especially rapidly and vividly in Albuquerque.



Circa 1861-1869 Michaux velocipede

The Michaux velocipedes built in Paris from 1861-1869 were the world's first pedal operated two-wheelers. This one is an example of the type raced from Paris to Roen in 1869 over a distance of 123 km with an average speed of 11.4 km/hour. Donated by from R.C. Learning History at Wheels




The Naughty Harvey Girls

On May 21, Dr. Richard Melzer, past president of the New Mexico Historical Society, presented an informative and amusing account of the Harvey Girls, the famous waitresses at the Harvey House restaurants who are credited with "Civilizing the West".

On May 28, Historian Randy Dunson presented the "The Belen Cut-Off and Settling of Eastern New Mexico Story" about the Santa Fe's Pecos Valley Line known as the Belen Cut-Off. It circumvented the mountain passes of Raton and opened eastern New Mexico from Belen to Clovis for homesteading.

Lawrence Rael, city COO has advised us he wants WHEELS to expand into the 166,000 sq ft building, 5 stories high, where 40 locomotives were repaired monthly for decades. We are working with the #2926 locomotive group, Wings for Life and other partners to create a world class attraction, educational facility, tourist attraction, food mecca, major national exhibit spaces and much more. Of course we will need major sponsors, grants for this huge move.

Saturday, June 25, WHEELS has been asked to participate with the Mayor at the State of City address and city is making large posters of WHEELS and rail history for this event. We will have a booth and later we will be given the city's pictures for display at the museum.

We will meet with head of City Economic Development, Charles Ashley next week to discuss growth of our mission and project.

Former Governor Bill Richardson called recently and is in support of our work as he has always been, having given \$2 million to invest in the property when it was purchased by city in 2007.
