On Thursday May 25, fifteen FOSM volunteers returned to the Challenge Trail extension, building new tread west and east of a VLC (very large culvert:) which runs under the second hairpin turn as you drive up 536. Water was still flowing through the culvert and down the drainage; part of the crew built a temporary rock crossing to use on this and future work sessions in the vicinity. West (and south) from the culvert, tread work continued where the crew left off during the hasty rainy retreat the previous week. East (and south) from the culvert, construction started in a flat grassy area and continued onto rocky flat terrain with many high-stumped oaks, before moving onto the steep sideslope below the highway (not pictured). Temps remained cool enough for pleasant working conditions throughout the day.
