On Thursday July 20, eleven volunteers returned to the Challenge Trail extension to build a reroute not far from the "red gate," plus finish-work nearby which included widening the tread and doing some rock cribwork. Volunteers also brushed back the corridor along the extension, and cleared corridor near the Bill Spring junction in preparation for building the final stretch of new trail at that end. The crew was enlightened by the presence of a volunteer (Mugzy) who has worked professionally and extensively leading trail construction on the Carson NF.

Early in the day there was an unfortunate mishap which resulted in a chauffeured trip to the hospital for Luis. (He's fine now! See photo below.) After some discussion, the remainder of the crew opted to continue working, finishing the reroute and cribwork, and making good progress on other finish-work heading east from there. Temps, naturally, were quite summery. No cloud cover this time.

So here's what happened...

The cribbing crew found some good, solid-sized rocks above the trail. After confirming that the area below was clear of fellow workers, they began to carefully move them down, one roll at a time, letting gravity do the work. However, gravity is double-edged, as Luis learned when his foot slipped. He went down, and the rock he was supporting did too. It happened to land on his arm and, being a doctor, he could tell right away it was broken. The arm that is – ulna and radius. Volunteers rolled the rock off, made sure Luis was stabilized, and assisted him up to the Crest Highway above. Bruce fetched Luis's truck, and John drove him to an orthopedic clinic in ABQ. The next day Luis went back for surgery, where they inserted a 10" long plate, for better healing. Full recovery expected!
