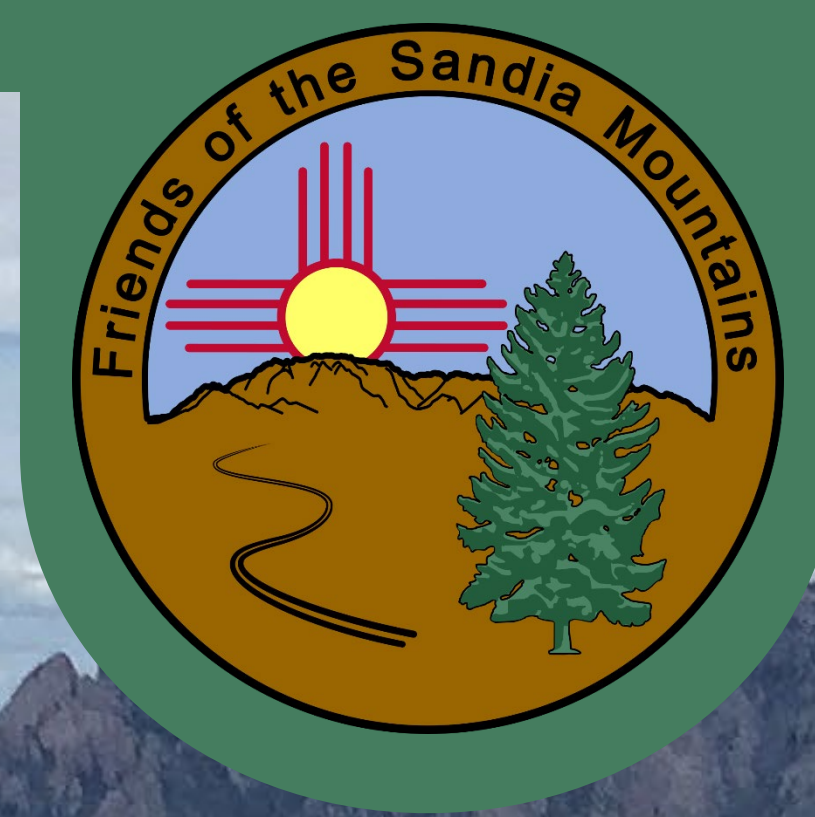

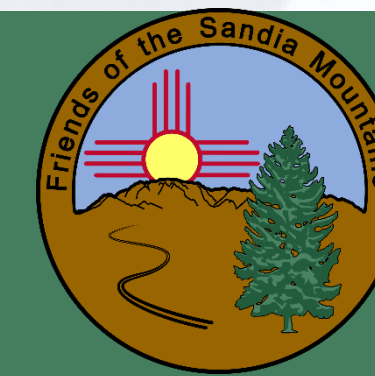

Each year on the first Saturday in June, we join the City Open Division and other organizations in sponsoring National Trails Day when volunteers make improvements on public lands.

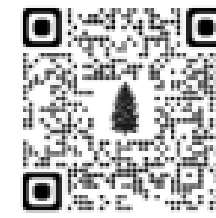

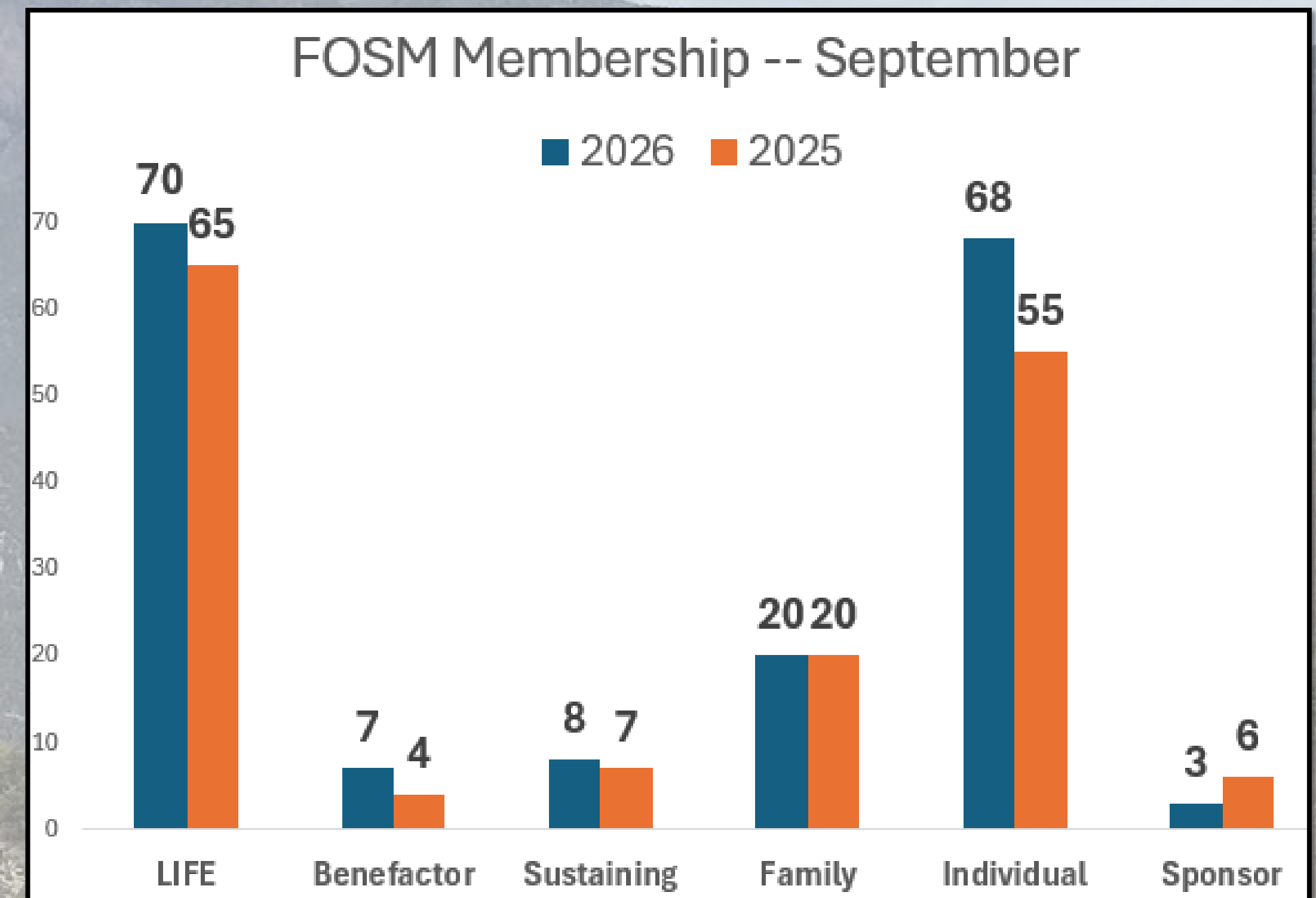

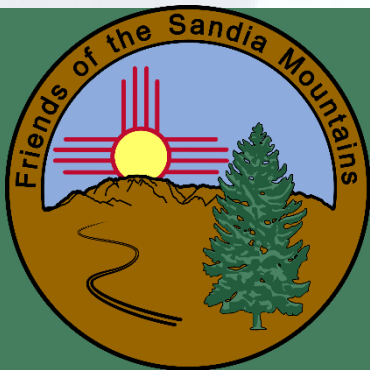

Speaker: Bjorn Fredrickson, Conservation Director, NM Wild

- Bjorn grew up in Seattle, Washington and spent his childhood and young adult years frequenting public lands across the West
- B.A and M.S. degrees in environmental studies and science from Yale University, as well as a graduate certificate in wilderness management from the University of Montana
- 13 years working with the U.S. Forest Service, with positions focused on the management of recreation, wilderness, wild & scenic rivers, commercial uses and infrastructure, archaeology, and minerals in Washington DC, Washington State, California, and New Mexico
- Bjorn joined the team at New Mexico Wild in 2023 and is engaged heavily in the organization's federal lands advocacy, public lands defense, and stewardship work
