Saturday-Monday President's Day weekend. Saturday and Sunday night, Feb 15 & 16, two yurts, Trujillo Meadows and Flat Mountain yurts run by the SW Nordic Center. 4 miles in, 500' up to Trujillo Meadows, 1000' up to Flat Mountain. We will start at the same trailhead/parking lot and split into two groups as the yurts are 4 miles apart, and people have the option of staying at one of the yurts both nights, or taking the beautiful trail between them and swapping with someone from the other camp for the second night. These yurts are smaller than Spruce Hole and accommodate 4 people each: 8 people total for the trip.

Approximate lodging cost is \$65/person. Transport and shared food is additional. All yurts are near Cumbres pass, an area known for its reliable deep snow.

Winter Driving

Inevitably cross country skiers will encounter winter driving sooner or later. Some tips to help with winter driving.

- a) Good snow tires for all 4 wheels.
- b) Gentle acceleration (linear and radial).
- c) On a snow/ice driving surface, a warmer surface provides less traction. Watch those shade $\leftrightarrow \rightarrow$ sun transitions.
- d) Turn off the cruise control.
- e) An easy way to add extra weight to the rear axle, fill the gas tank.

Helpful hints with NMCCSCeGroup email

The email server has a list of all members email addresses from those who submitted an email address on their membership form. This is how the server determines if emails are legitimate.

1) If you use an alternative email to send to NMCCSCeGroup, the server will refuse to send the email on to all as the 'from' email address is not in its list of 'members'. You MUST use the email that you provided on the membership form.

2) Please refrain from putting 'NMCCSCeGroup' in the 'cc' list when using the NMCCSCeGroup. The server gets confused and refuses to send your message due to 'too many recipients'.

3) The server will not send an email to the group if you are using your cell phone as the sender because your phone number is not in the member email list and therefore cannot generate a legitimate email.

4) Use the unsubscribe link at the bottom of the email to remove yourself from the email list. Once removed, you'll not get anymore NMCCSC email. No snow conditions, no newsletter, no meeting notification, nothing.

5) If you want to rejoin the email list or you are changing your email address, send an email to

'egroup@nmccskiclub.org' with your email address and full name. Your membership will be verified and you will be reinstalled in the Server List.

Downed Timber

The severe wind event last spring, was the result of the lowest barometric pressure ever recorded in Colorado (970.4 millibars at Lamar on March 13). The barometric pressure was similar to the eye of a category 2 hurricane, a rare event for the interior of a continent. The widespread strong winds knocked down far more timber (live and dead) across skiing and hiking trails than ever witnessed by long term residents. Somehow, volunteers found extra energy this year to clear out many of these obstacles in the Jemez and Sandias. Please say thank you to these volunteers, and let them have first place in the refreshment line.

INSTRUCTION

Beginning Cross Country Skiing:

Are you ready to learn about Cross Country skiing basics? It does not matter if you are brand new to the sport, haven't been on skis in years, or just have a friend you would like to introduce cross country skiing to. Come join us for Beginning Cross Country Skiing. The indoor session will be conducted the evening of Wednesday December 11 6:00-7:30 PM at the Lomas and Tramway Library (908 Eastridge NE 87123). The outdoor session on Sandia Mountain is scheduled after the New Year's holiday, with an eye on the snow conditions.

Outdoor lessons are free, but one must be a ski club member to attend. Outdoor lessons focus on learning balance and control, kick and glide technique, side step and kick turns. Participants also practice herringbone steps up hill, and the snowplow.

Other Cross Country Ski Instruction:

There are other ski instruction or practice options that can set up this ski season depending on interest:

1) Intermediate XC ski instruction,

A practice session at the beginner hill of Sandia Peak Ski Area to sharpen intermediate skill set. (Please see focus areas for improvement on ski club website, under ski instruction, intermediate skills.)

2) Telemark Instruction,

Telemark tips for beginner, intermediate or advanced skiing can be offered at one of the NM northern or Southern CO Ski areas depending on snow conditions. (Telemark equipment for downhill ski areas preferred. You need to own/borrow equipment, rent at KAFB, NM or rent in CO.) Also in Dec a list of which ski areas and dates that will be offering Telemark equipment demos and clinics will be available.

3) Avalanche Beacon Practice,

A December practice session in Sandia Mountains or Cibola National Forest picnic areas nearby. (Bring beacon, fresh batteries, avalanche probes and shovel to the practice.) This is not an avalanche class.

4) Avalanche class,

If you are looking for an avalanche class, sign up for an AIARE (American Institute of Avalanche Research & Education), Silverton Avalanche School, or other course online. Only certified instructors teach avalanche assessment and safety classes. A level 1 class consists of 24 hours of instruction, only a small portion of which is beacon search methods.

Signing up for Other Cross Country Ski instruction:

At the November Ski meeting, 11/14, there will be sign-up sheets available to express which skiing skills you are interested in having instruction be available and interest in attending. If you are unable to provide the information at the Nov ski meeting please send me an e-mail with the skill set you would like instruction to be available on.

The December Newsletter will list what other Cross Country ski instruction/practice will be available this ski season. It will be focused on the areas that I get the most interest on and instructors to sign up to assist.

Trip to Janet's Cabin



Our hut trip offering this year is a dandy! We're going to one of our favorites, Janet's Cabin, located near Breckenridge at 11,600 feet. This classic, Euro style cabin, which is the twin of nearby Francie's Cabin, features a wood-fired outdoor sauna, and indoor self-composting toilets. No going outside in the middle of the night! This is a "stretch" hut, with lots of room in the common areas for those who need their space! There are Nordic touring as well as turning opportunities from the hut.

This intermediate level trip involves a 4.6 mile ski in, and an elevation gain of just under 2000 feet. Skiers have the option of taking a free chair lift which is a fun way to cut a couple of hundred vertical feet off of the trip in.

Trip dates are January 20, 2020 to January 25. This includes an extra day to get home, if necessary, after skiing out of the hut. The cost is \$200, which includes group dinners at the hut.

As of press time we have 4 vacancies remaining. My contact info is on the website. Please let me hear from you if you want to go on this trip, or if you are interested in hut trips in general.

I expect this trip to be full before our December meeting.
